

Mary the Brave: Mary the God Bearer

As a young pastor and working mom, I struggled with the challenges of balancing work and home life, often while carrying a child in my womb, arms, on my hip, in

a front or back baby pack, or car seat. Now my children are adults, and I have the joy of watching them carry my grandchildren. They do it differently than I did, their car seats are much nicer than the ones we had, but like us, they carry their children with much love. I am still carrying my adult children and grandchildren and will always carry them, in my heart with much love. This Advent and Christmas season I'm reflecting on Mary, the God bearer. (In Greek it's Theotokos ².) Mary carried Jesus. Like all parents she carried her child with love, but she is also the God bearer. It was a brave thing Mary did to bear God into the world.

To love is a brave thing. It is a brave thing to become a parent. Mothers put their own lives at risk bearing a child in their womb and giving birth. It requires a measure of bravery for parents to bring a child into this world filled with the bad news of climate disasters, gun violence, war, political upheaval, racism, food/water insecurity, and escalating health and higher education costs.

History has painted Mary to be quiet, meek and mild, submissive to God's will, but a closer read shows us that Mary was brave. Mary was neither meek nor superhuman.³ She had grit. She was faithful, courageous, strong and brave. Most of all, she was human. Her encounter with the angel Gabriel, the messenger of God, made her brave. She knew that her pregnancy was

Luke 1: 26ff In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you... "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High, ... the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God... For nothing will be impossible with God." Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

dangerous and she could die giving birth. She also knew that as an unmarried teenaged mother it would cause upheaval in her family and community. She would give birth to Jesus during Roman occupation, a time of political unrest. Mary was brave.

Her encounter with the living God made her brave. Her encounter with God gave her bravery and the faith to see that if God was calling her; God would also protect her. It revealed to her that God chooses the people on the margins, those overlooked and underestimated. Bearing God in the world was to bring good news and hope to those oppressed. May Mary, the God Bearer, inspire us all to be brave!

This Advent and Christmas season, I invite you to be Theotokos, God Bearers. I invite you to carry the good news of Christ's birth, life, death and resurrection to all those we meet on this journey of life and the love of Jesus in your hearts always.



The Warm Heart of Advent



Hello dear friends,

Advent is a relatively short season in our Lutheran liturgical year, but in it we find space for many meaningful traditions and rituals in our homes and congregations.

Have you ever experienced or wondered what Advent and Christmas traditions exist in other regions of the country or around the world?

Christianity is present in 158 countries... what elements do you suppose are consistent across all cultures? What practices or traditions might be different as we prepare to share the story of the birth of Jesus Christ this season?

The Northwest Synod of Wisconsin has a partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Malawi, a geographically small, sub-Saharan country in Africa. During my first visit there in July of 2016 I asked our ELCM guide what Malawians did to prepare for and celebrate Christmas. He said, "Christmas is a religious holiday...we go to worship." There are, of course, festivities that happen in Malawi to celebrate the birth of Christ - dancing and singing and enjoying food together, children often participate in a nativity drama during worship, and some families give gifts, but in Malawi, this season has a simpler presence - Jesus is the heart of faith and life.

Malawi is fondly known as the *Warm Heart of Africa* - a nickname given to them by visitors who had received generous hospitality and love by the people there. Receiving this kind of generosity continues to be our experience when we visit. During this season of Advent, you are invited to use the this resource, *The Warm Heart of Advent*, which will include elements to help us remember our friends in Malawi through words, prayers, and action. It will provide a time to ponder what it looks like to embody hospitality, generosity, joy, and love together as we prepare for Emmanuel, *God with us*. Together we can lift up the truth that God's church is global, comprised of varied languages, worship spaces, and imaginations of Jesus. What curiosities might God be stirring in us as we consider these things?

As you begin your own Advent journey, whether in your household or at a church, know that you are not alone. We are beloved children of God. We are church together, messy and wonderful and meant to be in relationship with God and each other on this journey. We prepare for the coming of Jesus, the One who is central in our faith and in our lives, who embodies and calls us into unconditional, radical, and transforming peace and love.

May God be with you this advent season, (Mulungu akhale nanu)
